Callum Christensen, Kasey Hargreaves and Darci Air are all looking forward to early Christmas presents this year. They are all participating in high level competitions during December.



Science

We have commenced the examination period for our junior years. The date for the Year 7 Semester examination will be either Tuesday 13th or Thursday 15th November depending on the timetabled Science lessons. Students are to ask their teacher if they are unsure of the date their class will be doing the task. They must bring all equipment such as pens, pencils, ruler, eraser and calculator.

Completion of Semester examinations for Years 8-10 this week definitely does not signify the end of the coursework! Year 7 and 9 will continue with their Living World module, moving on to the Ecology topic. Year 8 will complete the Chemical World syllabus and then some of the classes will learn about Machines and others will do a Lifestyle Science topic. Year 10 classes will complete a Forensic Science module or will undertake extension Chemistry work. This will keep us busy all the way to the end of the term!

Year 11 have settled into their Year 12 coursework. To be successful in Science subjects at HSC requires a consistent approach to revision and consolidation of the coursework. All our subjects are rich in content and a deep knowledge and understanding is required for a high band result. We advise that students read and learn their notes and then begin to refine their examination technique.

Marine Studies have begun their unit of work on Snorkelling and are reminded to bring their gear on the days nominated by their teacher so that they can go and practise their skills.

On Thursday 25th October, Year 10 Marine Studies students went on an excursion to Lake Illawarra to complete the training for their boat licence. This was an enjoyable day out for those students who attended and a great opportunity to put their theory knowledge into practice. INTRODUCTION

The first month of term 4 has flown by and we are well into the completion of final examinations and assessments for the year. Of particular note this term has been the start of New Year 12 courses in HSIE. Ancient History, Modern History and Extension history have all entered their first year as revamped curriculum and we are excited to deliver what we believe are some fantastic topics. We are also excited to open our flexible learning hub that will act as a commerce/business based room to inspire and motivate students to think outside the box and provide an opportunity to work in a different environment. Once the room is complete we will provide a comprehensive update of how we plan to use it in the long term.

ABORIGINAL STUDIES - CULTURAL TRIP TO ARMIDALE

During the last school holidays Miss Hicks, Ms Tuck and Mr Dixon accompanied the Year 11 Aboriginal Studies class as well as some select Year 9 students on a cultural experience to Armidale and surrounding areas.



Early on the second Monday of the holiday's students and teachers boarded a train for the 8 hour (10 depending on which student you ask) journey to Armidale. Whilst Mr Dixon and Miss Hicks eagerly consumed copious amounts of coffee in preparation, students began excitedly discussing what they were most looking forward to over the next 4 days.

DAY 1

The majority of the first day was taken up by travel. When we finally arrived at our hotel in Armidale there wasn't much else to do other than have dinner, take a walk to the town centre and then head off to bed for what would be a huge day on Tuesday.

DAY 2

Tuesday proved to be an incredible eye opening experience that students and teachers alike will remember for a long time. First of all we visited Tingha, a fairly remote community with a large Aboriginal population. We discussed some of the social and cultural issues associated with such a community as well as some of the obstacles that residents might face. The highlight was visiting a massive pool that was a beautiful aqua colour from the natural minerals under the surface. This pool had been constructed with the assistance of former footballer Nathan Blacklock (one of Tingha's most famous members). We also discussed the importance of the pool for the youth of Tingha and what it actually provided them besides a place to swim on a hot day.

Visiting the site of the Myall Creek Massacre was a humbling experience that really opened up and highlighted the importance of Aboriginal education and not just in schools. As we walked the path reading about the horrible events that took place, students gained an understanding of a very dark part of Australian history. There was an eerie silence and an overwhelming feeling of sadness that fell upon the group as we reached the actual site of the massacre. Students were given the opportunity to sign a guest book that had been set up. For students of Aboriginal Studies the chance to visit such a place was invaluable and provided a rare opportunity to connect with the curriculum on a much more meaningful level

Emotionally drained we hopped back on the bus and headed back to the hotel where Mr Dixon cooked up one of the all-time great bbqs.

DAY 3

Wednesday threw up many very welcome surprises. What was supposed to be an exploration of local communities and sites turned into a culture and social experience that would be led by Nathan Blacklock.

The first half of the day saw students visit the University of New England for a tour of the campus and in particular the Aboriginal Education centre. Students were given a guided tour and talk from lecturers on how the university supports indigenous students and what was on offer to them. We then took a tour of the library and the natural history museum. After a picnic lunch we headed for Tamworth where we met Nathan. He took us to the Tamworth Youth Centre where we were told stories of the Dreaming, sang songs in the local aboriginal language and discussed many issues relevant to Aboriginal people living in country NSW. To be given such an intimate insight into a community was incredible and doing justice to this experience is impossible in a simple report. We finished our final day by having dinner with Nathan and his family. We could not have been more thankful for the time and effort Nathan put in to making our experience so memorable.

DAY 4

Thursday saw students and teachers up early once again in preparation for the long train trip home. We recounted many stories from the past few days and there is no doubt that Miss Hicks and her Aboriginal Studies class have a distinct advantage going into the HSC. Students were also given an impromptu poetry lesson from Mr Dixon which (almost) everyone appreciated.

As Head Teacher of HSIE it was an absolute pleasure to attend. I would like to thank the students for their impeccable behaviour and willingness to get as much out of the trip as possible. Thank you to the parents of those students who attended for supporting us in our attempt to provide an experience outside of the normal classroom environment. Thank you to Kara Tuck for accompanying us on our trip and providing her knowledge and understanding of important topics and of course a final massive thank you to Miss Hicks whose dedication to education and in particular her Aboriginal Studies class is immense.

School Student Transport Scheme

School student applications for 2019 open from Monday, 15th October 2018.

Students progressing to Year 3 and Year 7 do not need to re-apply if they:

- Are continuing at the same school
- Are residing at the same address
- Have not been sent an expiry notification from Transport for NSW

Where a student meets the new distance eligibility, the system will automatically update their entitlement. If they do not meet the new eligibility, they will receive an expiry notification.

Students who have an entitlement approved under a medical condition which is due to expire will receive a notification advising them to re-apply.

Term Bus Pass holders will receive a notification to re-apply.

If students need to update their information or re-apply, they should go online to: https://apps.transport.nsw.gov.au/ssts/updateDetails

Applications need to be submitted before 31 December 2018 to ensure student entitlements are updated and their current entitlement/card is not cancelled. If their application is submitted after 31 December 2018, the system will automatically cancel a card and a new one will need to be issued.

Students in the Opal network applying for a SSTS or Term Bus Pass entitlement for the first time will receive their card at their nominated postal address. Cards will be mailed out during December 2018 and January 2019.



Community members, school groups, families and friends are encouraged to attend a commemorative ceremony and parade as members of the 4th / 3rd Battalion exercise their Freedom of Entry to the City on Saturday 17 November.

The event will start in MacCabe Park at 1pm where the $4^{\rm th}\,/\,3^{\rm rd}$ Battalion will lay wreaths at the Cenotaph.

NSW Governor General David Hurley AC DSC [Ret'd] will attend the ceremony with Wollongong City Lord Mayor Councillor Gordon Bradbery AM prior to the march from the Cenotaph in MacCabe Park. The march will proceed into the City Centre, via Globe Lane and finish at the eastern end of the Mall at Kembla Street.

The ceremony commemorates the centenary of the end of World War I in November 1918.

The City welcomes the Battalion exercising their right to Freedom of Entry. The Battalion was granted Freedom of Entry in March 2004. The ceremony and parade on 17 November will recognise the vital role the $4^{\rm th}/3^{\rm rd}$ battalion has played in the Australian defence forces.

Everyone is encouraged to come out and pay tribute to our local Battalion which has provided assistance to our defence forces for many years.

It is a good opportunity for all community members to see a traditional military parade through the heart of Wollongong where Battalion members will have their bayonets fixed, colours flying and music playing.

The 'Freedom of Entry to the City' is an honour that dates back to medieval times and was granted to military units that earned a city's trust. Citizens of these cities had the power to refuse entry to armed groups unless the citizens were confident of their own safety.
