Enrichment Class 2019

Students in Year 6, 2018 will be able to apply for one of two Enrichment classes for Year 7, 2019: The STEM class and/or the Arts class. The two Enrichment classes will follow the same curriculum pattern as all students in Year 7, however each will have a unique focus which aims to further cater to the strengths and talents of students. Students will still sit the test and participate in the interview process. 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HSC Results

We eagerly await the HSC results which will be released to students and schools on Thursday 14th December. Students may contact the HSC Results Inquiry Centre – 1300 13 83 23 after results are released. The service offers a valuable opportunity for students to talk with experienced BOSTES staff who are able to answer questions about their HSC results or the systems behind determining and processing them.

Gonski Funding & School Plan

Bulli High School has utilised the funds received this year to provide teachers with release time to support student learning, to purchase more furniture for the library flexible learning space, to fund a SLSO mentor for our Aboriginal students, to fund a teacher to work with faculties to cater to the individual needs of students, and to fund Student learning Support officers to work with individual and small groups of students. We are currently writing the School Plan 2018 - 2020 and hence our expected expenditure of the 2018 funding. The draft plan is available on the school website and parents are welcome to view and provide the school with feedback.

To cover the cost of this facility the merchant service fee of 1.5% will need to be passed onto customers using EFTPOS from 5 February 2018. We thank you for your understanding.

Reports will also be distributed to Year 7 - 10 on 14th December 2017. Year 11 do not receive a report at this time.


Prior to this day we ask that all students return any textbooks or other school resources to their class teacher. Library books should also be returned before the end of term.

Our 7E students and Ms Wilson showcased their dramatic skills at the recent Showcase. Our Year 7 classes are currently wrapping up their involvement in the Renaissance Reading Program which has been co-ordinated by our wonderful Teacher Librarian, Ms Martin. We are really pleased that this program will continue in 2018 as it offers students a great opportunity to read quality literature and enhance their reading comprehension skills. In addition, Spellodrome will remain a key element of the school's focus on literacy next year.

Mathematics

MATHS AND STATS EXPLORER DAY

Last Friday 1st December, ten students from Bulli High School, comprised of nine Year 8s and one Year 9 student, attended a Maths and Stats Explorers Day held at the University of Wollongong.

The day started with a Maths Relay where students from 5 different schools were split into groups and collaboratively solved a raft of maths problems. Initially, the students were somewhat shy and reserved being mixed up with new people, but once the problem-solving began, the interaction and communication within the groups was lively and productive. They maintained their interest and focus throughout the entire two-hour time limit in a bid for their team to accumulate as many points as possible. A steady supply of apples, bananas, lamingtons and cupcakes provided the energy necessary for the students to get through the 68 questions! Academic staff and university mathematics students were on hand to assist with some of the trickier problems.

Following the 'Maths Relay', the students took a tour around the university campus and were then treated to a pizza lunch.


Lunch was followed by a change of venue to a gym space where the students were involved in some physical as well as mathematical challenges. Again, teams were competing for points. After an hour, the 28.8 degree heat was sufficient to sap the energy of the students, and we all moved to a lecture theatre.

The day concluded with talks from students studying Maths at UOW explaining how it worked and what career opportunities were available. A recent graduate, who is now working in the 'real world', also shared his story and how the study of Mathematics was of benefit to him.

The winning team was then announced and included Callum Conway and Michael Mouawad from Bulli High School.

Positive feedback from the students about the day included enjoying the opportunity to meet and interact with new people, the food (!) checking out UOW and hearing from current students.

It was a pleasure to accompany these ten students to the University of Wollongong. Their excellent behaviour, engagement and co-operation were a credit to themselves and Bulli High School.




CROSSROADS UPDATE: NOVEMBER 2017

Recently Bulli High School hosted a 'Living Books' event. This is a Wollongong City Council initiative whereby members of the community offer to share their diverse and fascinating life stories in open conversation with others. Year 11 students had preselected 2 'books' of whom they were interested in speaking to and these conversations took place on November 28.

There were strong personal connections for young people dealing with a number of issues affecting young people, as well as plenty of learning about cultural perspectives. Conversations included reflections on future careers and pathways and ways to rethink the pressure of the HSC. Many interesting themes were raised including:

- "what value do I place on being happy in my employment",
- "should the date for Australia Day change?",
- "don't lose hope for your future, if your marks aren't what you wanted"
- "why aren't girls included in the White Ribbon Day event?"
- "why are some questions about transgender inappropriate?"
- "how wars change people's lives forever"

School Newsletter Article: Adolescent human papillomavirus (HPV) vaccination program

In early 2017 parents/carers of Year 7 students were asked to provide consent for their children to receive three doses of HPV vaccine in the NSW School Vaccination Program.

Most* Year 7 students who have received two doses of HPV vaccine are considered to be fully vaccinated and <u>do not require a further dose</u>.

This change is based on recent international studies that show for children aged 9 to 14 years of age, two doses of HPV vaccine provide the same protection as three doses, as long as the second dose is given at least six months after the first dose. Based on this evidence, the World Health Organization (WHO) now recommends a two-dose HPV schedule, and this has already been adopted in comparable countries (i.e. the UK, Canada, the United States and New Zealand) and is now being adopted in Australia.

In 2017 Year 7 students were given the second dose of HPV vaccine at least six months after the first dose to accommodate the urgent roll-out of the Meningococcal W Response Program to Year 11 and 12 students. Year 7 students who have received only one dose of HPV this year will be offered their second dose in 2018. Parents/carers whose children were vaccinated in 2017 but who still wish for their child to receive a third dose of HPV vaccine can access a free dose from their general practitioner (GP).

* Students with significantly impaired immune systems are still recommended to have three doses of HPV vaccine. Parents of these students should make arrangements to complete the vaccine course with their GP or by calling their local public health unit on 1300 066 055.

What does a School Counsellor do?

Why do we have a school counsellor?

School Counsellors work with teachers, year advisers, careers advisers, the principal and senior teachers to assist students and their families and work to create safe, caring schools, free from violence and discrimination.

How are they different from teachers?

School Counsellors are trained experienced teachers who also have a degree in psychology and post-graduate qualifications in school counselling. They work with students of all ages, and their families, from Kindergarten to Year 12.

What might they do?

Work with students, parents or carers and teachers to better meet the needs of all students.

Counselling for students

Assisting parents or carers to make informed decisions about their child's education

Assess students' learning and behaviour
Assist schools to know how to best support
students with a disability

Work with other agencies who are also working with students

What would they help me with?

Worry about school work Conflict with friends,
Being in trouble at school

Feeling "down", confused or angry.

Advise parents about their child's school progress, educational options, including access to special education services and behaviour Provide information about help available from other agencies.



How do I get to see a school counsellor?

Students may ask to see the school counsellor


A teacher, parent or carer, or a friend may suggest you see a school counsellor or ask the school counsellor to talk to you.

School counsellors are not at every school every day. It is necessary for parents or carers to make an appointment by telephoning the school.

Students can ask their teachers, year advisers and .welfare staff how to see a school counsellor in their particular school

If I go to the school counsellor everyone will know.

What you say to the school counsellor is confidential, they will check with the student, parent or carer before passing on information to others.
