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Year 12 Final Term

As we approach the end of Term 3, Year 12 students are nearing the completion of thirteen years of school. Though some classes will have completed the coursework, all class teachers will be preparing their students for the HSC exams, ensuring that all content has been completed, that students are completing work to the HSC standard, giving final advice and ensuring students are HSC ready.

The expectation is that students attend each lesson, every day until the last day of Term 3 as this is invaluable time and access to teacher experience and knowledge.

Science

The Science faculty would like to welcome Matthew Crouch from the UoW. Matthew is an educational paraprofessional who will be with us two days a week working with individual and small groups of students to support individualised learning plans and help develop curriculum materials for the students. He is very keen and motivated and is looking forward to working with the staff and students.

This term, Year 10 students will be working on a unit of work on scientific design in the lead up to a submission of a Student Research Project (SRP). This involves students selecting and researching a topic, developing a hypothesis and planning a controlled investigation to test it. An information sheet will be provided to students and they are encouraged to look closely at the marking criteria given to maximise their marks and see what needs to be included. This planned investigation will be carried out at home. Students will record their observations then write up a report to be submitted to their teacher.

Some of the experiments that students are currently doing in class will help support them with designing a controlled experiment and help build on their scientific skills. An example of this is a series of three experiments to see the effect of changing variables such as weight, string length and angle of swing on a pendulum.

YEAR 9 MARINE STUDIES – EXCURSION TO AUSTRALIAN MUSEUM & SYDNEY AQUARIUM

On Friday 22 June, 55 Year 9 students from the elective subject, Marine Studies, went on an excursion to the Australian Museum and Aquarium in Sydney. In the morning, they went on a tour of the Australian Museum and viewed various skeletal displays of marine organisms. A particular point of interest was the crocodile exhibition. After lunch they walked over to the Sydney Aquarium. Many different species of sharks, corals and fish were observed. Students experienced the penguin exhibits and rode through the display on a boat. Our students are provided with a wealth of opportunities to undertake excursions and expeditions, extending the boundaries of the classroom into the wider world. Whether it is one of our regular fishing expeditions to Bulli Beach or gaining their boat licence, our students enjoy all the possibilities that exist to apply their theoretical understanding in engaging practical settings. This exciting trip could not have happened if it were not for the incredible and devoted teachers in the Science faculty. All the students that went along on the trip are greatly appreciative of the time and effort put into making this trip possible. Thanks go to our excellent Marine Science teachers, Mr McKenzie, Miss Contarin and Mr Deans.

- How might I go about improving in Semester 2?

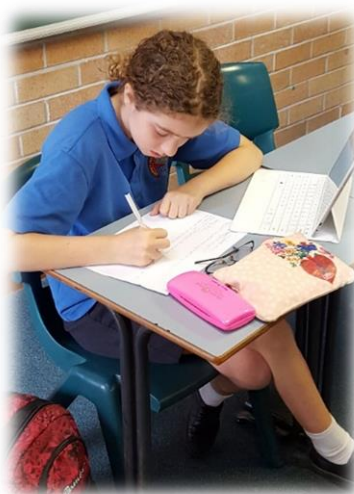

Gold Duke of Edinburgh Trip

Northern Territory

1st – 14th July



Our Gold Duke of Edinburgh students recently completed the 2 hikes required for the Adventurous Journey section of their award in the Northern Territory. During the initial hike, students completed the 62 kilometre, Jatbula Trail in Nitmiluk National Park. It was an incredibly scenic trail that tested the students both physically and mentally. Most days began early in an attempt to cover as much distance as possible before the daytime temperatures reached 35 degrees. Refreshing waterholes at the campsites each night provided much relief for everyone.

The second hike for the students was completed as a series of arduous day walks through Kakadu National Park and Arnhem Land, covering spectacular sites such as Gunlom Falls and Jim Jim Falls. A day trip into Arnhem Land, with a ranger guide and local custodian, provided students with the unique opportunity to hear first-hand the stories behind some amazing indigenous rock art and traditions.

Many stories, sunsets and experiences were shared by the students throughout the 2 week adventure and, undoubtedly, lifelong bonds were formed.

Seven new school zone traffic offences

To help schools keep the school zone safer for all pedestrians and drivers there are seven new traffic infringements with new fines.

None of the seven offences attract demerit points when committed elsewhere on the road but in a school zone they each come with two points.

The changes are:

1. Stopping in intersection - Under the changes if a driver commits this offence in a school zone they will receive a penalty of \$439 and 2 demerit points.
2. Stop within 20m of intersection (traffic lights) - Under the changes if a driver commits this offence in a school zone they will receive a penalty of \$439 and 2 demerit points.
3. Stop within 10m of intersection (no traffic lights) - Under the changes if a driver commits this offence in a school zone they will receive a penalty of \$439 and 2 demerit points.
4. Stop near bicycle crossing lights - Under the changes if a driver commits this offence in a school zone they will receive a penalty of \$439 and 2 demerit points.
5. Obstruct access to ramp/path/passageway - Under the changes if a driver commits this offence in a school zone they will receive a penalty of \$330 and 2 demerit points.
6. Not parallel park in the direction of travel - Under the changes if a driver commits this offence in a school zone they will receive a \$330 fine and 2 demerit points.
7. Parallel park close to dividing line - Under the changes if a driver commits this offence in a school zone they will receive a \$330 fine and 2 demerit points.

Supported School Transport

and transition to the National Disability Insurance Scheme

As the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS) comes into place, the Australian Government wants to hear directly from NDIS participants, parents, carers, school communities and transport providers about how we could best support transport to and from school for NDIS participants into the future.

Transport provider and stakeholder workshops

We are currently working with state and territory governments and the National Disability Insurance Agency (NDIA) to understand if and how supported school transport could be delivered in the NDIS. To help inform future options, we are holding workshops with the services and supports delivering supported school transport, such as transport providers, disability services, advocates and other interested stakeholders. Workshops will be held in a number of locations across all states and territories during June and July 2018.

BITE BACK is an evidence-based online interactive space where young Australians can learn how to amplify the good stuff in life!

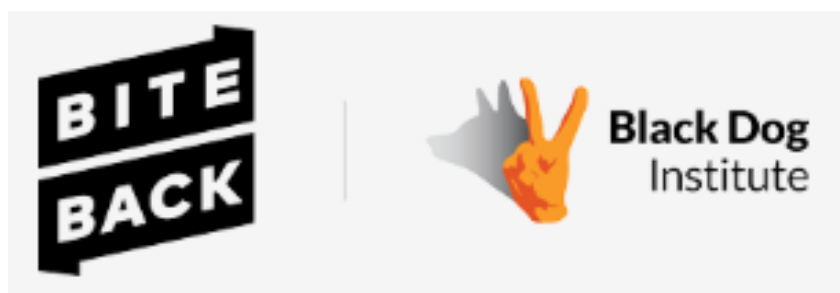
